EDUCATION

Effective July 1, 2017 the State of Washington will be requiring the following:

907.10 NICET: National Institute for Certification in Engineering Technologies.

907.10.1 Scope. This section shall apply to new and existing fire alarm systems.

907.10.2 Design review: All construction documents shall be reviewed by a NICET III in fire alarms or a licensed professional engineer (PE) in Washington prior to being submitted for permitting. The reviewing professional shall submit a stamped, signed, and dated letter; or a verification method approved by the local authority having jurisdiction indicating the system has been reviewed and meets or exceeds the design requirements of the state of Washington and the local jurisdiction (effective July 1, 2017).







907.10.3 Installation/maintenance: All installation, inspection, testing, maintenance and programing not defined as "Electrical Work" by chapter 19.28 RCW shall be completed by a NICET II in fire alarms (effective July 1, 2017).

We don't want there to be any surprises on July 1, 2017. Knowing the NICET testing process can be difficult and time consuming, we wanted to let everyone know well in advance what requirements are coming. I do not know anything further on this right now. APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

The ESA-WA apprenticeship program provides a great opportunity to enhance the on-the-job education of your apprentices, and if you are doing prevailing wage jobs, you should certainly consider it.

This program is dedicated to training apprentices in the electronic life safety, security and systems industry and qualifies persons to install, maintain, repair and inspect equipment. The recruitment, selection, employment and training of apprentices during their apprenticeship shall be without discrimination because of race, sex, color, religion, national origin, age, disability, or as otherwise specified by law. We encourage the application of female and minority apprentices.

ASAP TO PSAP

What is it? The Automated Secure Alarm Protocol (ASAP) service is a computer-aided dispatch system designed by the Central Station Alarm Association (CSAA) and the Association of Public Safety Communications Officials (APCO Int'l).

Instead of our operators calling into the 911 Center and telling the operator where and what the alarm is on, the signal is automatically pushed to the 911 Center, populating the operators screen with the alarm information, including the site address. Seattle is moving toward accepting ASAP to PSAP because of the following:

Eliminates calls into the 9-1-1 Center • Virtually eliminates the mistakes and miscommunication between humans talking over the telephone • 9-1-1 processing time is two to three minutes which translates to two or three minute's reduction in response times • Excellent customer service from shorter response times. According to the City of Richmond, Virginia, "With the advent of the ASAP program, critical life safety signals and highly accurate information is processed in seconds, not minutes, through the NLETS system of state- to- state communication, thus insuring that critical time will not be lost, and with the assurance that complete and accurate information is transmitted to the PSAP each and every time."
